From Jan Feldhouse, Our Regional Coordinator

At this time of the year, we are usually at or anticipating going to the NAME convention. We all miss that opportunity this year, but we are happy that everybody is staying safe. I was contemplating all the activities that happen at a convention. I have been in NAME over 20 years and never knew exactly what the Mell Prescott Award was for or the significance of the person for whom it is named. I thought I would share what my researchers found. (Thank you Nancye and Kim.)

In 1986 the children of the talented crafters, the late Mell Prescott, established the Mell Prescott Award for Creativity in Miniatures. This is an annual award that recognizes a member of the Academy of Honor who has contributed substantially to the growth and enjoyment of the miniatures hobby. The recipient is announced each year at the National Convention. The award is an engraved sterling silver medallion. This is the highest award that NAME can bestow on a member.

Mell was born and raised in the west and attended Utah State College and studied art where she met her future husband, Blake Prescott. He went on completing his education in medicine and psychiatry. They moved to Connecticut in the early 1940s. Mell was a consummate artist and shared her talent with others by teaching and lecturing in many states, with emphasis on illustrating the creative interfaces between art forms such as antiques, flower arrangements, antique reproductions, and fine arts. She eventually started collecting dolls and then miniatures.

Once Mell saw a mini cradle that she wished to purchase but the owner refused. Undaunted she went home and made the piece herself. She acquired a table saw, jig saw, jeweler's lathe, dental drills, and whatever else was necessary to make her beautiful pieces. She purchased old combs to make piano keys, old cloth to upholster, and old jewelry to complete her unique furniture. Mell started doing reproductions of antiques in one-inch and was in her seventies when she delved into half-inch scale. Her pieces

are housed in a variety of museums. Mell mixed art forms and taught others which brought out their abilities. She shared her knowledge.

Mell Prescott died in her early eighties and was an inspiration to all. In the years she was active in miniatures, I reminded myself that she did her work without all the terrific tools we have available to us today like computers, lasers, and Internet. She was a marvel. I hope this quick synopsis enlightens you of the history of the award.

My love for miniatures goes back as far as I can remember. Since we were Chicagoans, as a young child, my mother always took me to Marshall Fields to see their Christmas toy land, the huge 7 story tree, and later Colleen Moore's doll castle. The castle to me was the most magical place in the world. Fields is where I saw my first doll house, a beautiful wooden

ranch style which later appeared under our tree on Christmas day. Once it was assembled, the house became the central interest in my life. All allowances and extra helper jobs were squirreled away waiting for a trip to my aunt's house which had a miniature shop nearby. Soon the house was overly populated both inside and up on the full-length patio roof. While that house was destroyed and is only a wonderful memory, the love of minis never left my heart.

Life took over, as with most of us, and family took precedence. Once I received my degree from Wittenberg University, I taught for several years in various places and at one point was raising five children by myself. This is when I became an accountant for the Marathon Oil Co. When I met my wonderful hubby, Charlie, he introduced us to the world of horses and shows. Since his job required him to be on the road a lot, I learned to drive a truck and pull a horse trailer. Since I made all the girls' show outfits, yearning

to do miniatures was again delayed and unsatisfied. Then came retirement, a gift of a dollhouse under the Christmas tree, and moving to Las Vegas.

All this time passed without me knowing that there was any such thing as organized groups of miniature lovers and builders. My new life began when right after we got to Las Vegas. Charlie was reading the paper and saw an article about the Las Vegas Miniature Enthusiasts meeting at the library. He just said, "you are going", and that's how I started this most amazing and challenging journey. Luckily, I didn't walk out of the meeting which was my first thought. The project, taught by Mel Koplin, was making a globe and floor stand using a deodorant ball. Everyone was so friendly, kind, helpful and accepting of this novice. I ended up with a very acceptable project, an avenue to my wildest dreams, and truly faithful, kind, funny, talented friends. Who could ask for more?

I haven't been to many state days and national conventions. The ones I was fortunate enough to attend, though, were wonderful and the projects amazing. I am just now finishing my Christmas gift house from so long ago and am loving it. Too many ongoing projects got in the way, so Covid "lock up" helped me. My favorite project is usually what the project of the moment happens to be. Reworking a twelve-room mansion I bought at a garage sale in California was my largest project and a huge lesson in patience, ingenuity, how to accomplish goals, and faithfully staying with a project to completion.

Our entire club participated in the national trailer project. Our goal to commemorate a period of our lives holds a special place in my heart. Naturally, I did a horse trailer to hopefully interest my girls in miniatures. I had forgotten how many things we loaded up each week. The daughter who took the hint had nothing to do with horses. That part failed but she does beautifully imaginative larger scale creations.

The creation, if I had to pick one, that is at the top of my favorites list is the Wizard's Castle we made out of a Hallmark trick or treat box that must not have sold well. The Hallmark store sold them to us for \$5 apiece and now they are on the internet for \$60. We learned to use all sorts of mediums in doing these boxes which took several months. The boxes were stood on end, the cover became a side wall with a fireplace, the candy box houses a winding staircase made by us, the floor of the wizard's room is stone, and the room holds all his potions, books, and wizardly stuff including a freestanding candelabra. Mine has a resident wizard doing his spells.

Sometimes I want to pinch myself to make sure all these wonderful friends I met through minis are real. Because of their generosity with their amazing skills, I have learned so much such as woodworking, making and dressing porcelain dolls in scale, building to scale, extending my imagination beyond its old stale borders, and too much more to list. Twenty years as a member of NAME has been the best.

I still have a huge bucket list of projects to do or finish but I think that just makes me a true mini trooper. Everything I see is equated to how would it look in mini form. I think it's a disease and thankfully incurable and shared with so many. So instead of complaining we create and meet to do more creating together. Who could top that!
