Spring has sprung! Hopefully, this year looks a bit brighter than last. As a young girl, my grandmother, aunts, and mom scurried around their homes, cleaning, scrubbing and "letting in the air." I have not inherited the "spring clean" gene. However, I have made a concerted effort in trying to organize and clean up my mini area.

To this point, the NAME Create.miniatures.org recently hosted a Lunch and Learn by Preble McDaniel, aka The Organized Miniaturist. Her motto is "work smarter not harder." I would like to thank her for her time and tips. Preble had a bunch of tips and showed us her containers and systems that work for her. She works mostly in quarter scale but had some one-inch supplies also.

Some items she used to store kits, fabric, and ribbon (which she sorts by color) are photo boxes because they are same size and can stack easily. She labels outside with subject content, and within the box she divides it by topic. Preble likes divider boxes to keep items separated (like her beads) and they can be economically gotten from dollar or craft stores. She keeps her flower punches, wallpaper, and rugs in plastic pouch sheets in a binder. Another tip is to keep all same size plastic bags together. On her worktable, she has a spinner (ordered from Amazon), which she keeps her supplies currently needed for a project. Preble encourages putting items immediately away after usage.



Preble emphasized donating items you no longer want to NAME. The person collecting these items is Alician Pearce, 1727 Newport Ave., Janesville, WI 53545. Please donate. Preble stressed trashing certain things that cannot be restored or repurposed. I have some of these tips incorporated in my craft room. I need to do more and spring into action this Spring! I surprised her when I turned it into a black stallion by sticking my drawing of a horse's head onto its front and then proceeded to scoot around our apartment while holding the handle on top as my saddle horn. Gertrude Clary, my beloved maternal grandmother, was my Mrs. Claus. She gave me my first miniature for Christmas when I was a teen. It was a 1:12 mahogany Victorian dresser which looked just like the one she had in her own bedroom. A few years later, she took me to a shop on Cleveland's west side where she purchased my college going-away gift: a one-inch scale Federal Victorian dollhouse kit. That kit sat in her attic until I became pregnant with our

son 15 years later and the hormones went into overdrive. My husband helped me build it.

Before retiring from my career as an educator, I only collected miniatures. As Secretary of the Albuquerque Mini Makers for the last two years and as an active member of the club for almost 10, I have been able to hobnob with some of the best at their craft. I have learned the importance of using the right tool and how glue can be my best friend or worst foe. Although I am not a consummate miniaturist, I am proud of a handful of pieces which have made it from conception to presentation. My Breakfast in the



Garden/Hotel lobby scene, inspired by the 2016 NAME luncheon in Seattle, is one of my favorites. I was a newcomer at that conference and fell in love with the magnificence of the artistry and magnanimous nature of all the people I met there. I am also grateful for the Esther Nordin dolls I found in an antique store back in Ohio. They fit beautifully into my NAME day bridal shop window. I feel Ms. Nordin is the reason I won a blue ribbon at our NM State Fair first time out of the gate. When Covid is in our rear-view mirror, my husband and I plan on visiting the mini village of Madurodam in The Hague as a bucket list treat. But, more importantly, I look forward to meeting with all my talented MiniMakers to share and create more memories soon.
